Are you Ready to Join the Team?

The City of La Verne **Reserve Police Officer Program** has been in existence for over 50 years. After formal training, the men and women must volunteer 16 hours a month performing the duties of a sworn Police Officer, and augmenting the Police Force.



Reserve Officers for La Verne attend the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Reserve Academy. All equipment is provided by the City of La Verne.

Reserves are paid up to \$100.00 a month stipend, upon completion of the Monthly requirements. Reserve Police Officers are assigned to a variety of details, such as sporting events, L.A. County Fair, car shows and other city sponsored events. Reserves are also a part of the La Verne Police Bike Patrol.

Minimum Requirements:

- Must be 21 years of age at appointment
- High School graduate or equivalent
- Height – weight must be proportionate
- Vision must meet P.O.S.T. requirements
- Normal hearing in both ears
- U.S. Citizenship required, or must have applied within last 12 months
- Applicant's background must be free from felony/misdemeanor convictions involving moral turpitude and excessive number of driving violations/citations.

Applications are available at La Verne City Hall. The application must be completed and a photocopy of the applicant's valid California driver's License must accompany the application

when returned to City Hall. A **"NO SMOKING"** policy is in effect in all City of La Verne facilities. Applicants will be notified by mail as to when and where the written and physical examinations will be given. The written examination is given annually in April, and candidates who successfully pass the written and physical examinations will attend the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Reserve Academy in September.



The City of La Verne was founded in 1887 and was incorporated in 1906. La Verne is nestled in the foothills of the San Gabriel – Pomona Valleys. La Verne is approximately 35 miles east of Los Angeles and has a population of over 33,000 people. Although La Verne is located in metropolitan Los Angeles County, it is a "close knit" community which has been able to retain its "small town" traditions and virtues. With eight mobile home parks and three retirement communities, La Verne has a significant senior citizen population. In addition, due to an influx of new upscale housing during the past two decades, La Verne also enjoys a large clientele of school age youth. The city provides a range of services including Police, Fire, Water, Streets, Planning, Parks, and Community services. La Verne is a well balanced residential community which includes a good mix of commercial and industrial uses as well as the University of La Verne, an airport, fine public and private schools.
